Foreign Language Courses for Beginners at Okayama University

- Okayama University's introductory foreign language education aims to foster students with the following skills and attitudes:
- Knowledge of and basic proficiency in a new language other than Japanese or English.
- 2 An attitude of respect for and willingness to understand the diverse cultures of countries and regions different from Japan.
- 3 A commitment to engaging in communication and working collaboratively to achieve goals, regardless of the language or cultural background of others.
- At Okayama University, students can study a total of seven foreign languages—German, French, Chinese, Korean, Spanish, Russian, and Italian
 —as part of the university-wide general education curriculum.

These seven languages are divided into two groups, Group A and Group B, based on differences in how the courses are offered.

Through learning a new language, we invite you to experience the joy of "broadening your own world"

A Group

:German, French, Chinese, and Korean

- Introductory Courses for First-Year Students (One 100-minute class per week; one credit per Quarter)
- Held during faculty-designated time slots on Mondays or Thursdays (Multiple classes are available for each language)
- Class assignments are determined by lottery based on students' course preferences submitted prior to the start of the first Quarter

B Group

Russian, Spanish, and Italian

- "Basic" Courses for Beginners
 One 100-minute class per week; one credit per Quarter
- Offered to students from all faculties during designated time slots specific to each language (One class is available for each language)
- No lottery-based class assignment is conducted in advance



Curriculum for Introductory Foreign Languages


- Group A Introductory Foreign Languages (German, French, Chinese, and Korean)
- For first-year students, Group A languages offer a variety of courses designed to support gradual learning of each language's basic structure and usage over the course of one academic year. These include:
- · Introductory I & II, which provide a step-by-step foundation in the language;
- · Introductory (Conversation), an optional course that complements the content of Introductory I & II.

In addition, a wide range of advanced learning opportunities are available, such as:

- · Intermediate courses, aimed at refining the knowledge and skills acquired in the introductory level;
- · Short-term overseas training programs (2–3 weeks), where students can apply the language in real-life settings while experiencing daily life abroad;
- · Online exchange programs, in which students collaborate on projects with Chinese and Korean students who are studying Japanese.
- Group B Introductory Foreign Languages (Russian, Spanish, and Italian)

For beginners—including second-year students and above—Group B languages offer Basic courses that focus on learning the fundamental structure and usage of each language.

These courses can be taken in parallel with Group A's Introductory I & II courses, allowing students to explore multiple languages simultaneously.



Introduction to Introductory Foreign Language Courses

German (Deutsch) [Introductory I & II / Introductory (Conversation) / Intermediate]

German is a Germanic language, just like English. In fact, it can be considered a sibling to English, sharing linguistic roots.

As your studies progress, you will come to appreciate not only the close relationship between German and English, but also the unique depth of the German language—its precise and intricate sentence structures, and the fascinating mechanisms behind them.

Begin by enjoying the distinctive, resonant sound of German, and let that lead you into the rich cultural world of the German-speaking regions!

French (Français) [Introductory I & II / Introductory (Conversation) / Intermediate]

Throughout the Middle Ages, a significant number of French words entered the English language, resulting in many shared vocabulary items between the two. However, in terms of linguistic classification, French belongs to the Romance language group, along with Italian and Spanish. Languages in this group not only share remarkably similar grammatical structures, but are also known for their beautiful and appealing sounds. We invite you to explore French—a Romance language rich in elegance and charm.

Chinese (汉语) 【Introductory I & II / Introductory (Conversation) / Intermediate 】

Chinese is the most widely spoken language in the world, characterized by simplified Chinese characters (known as Simplified Characters) and its unique pronunciation system. Although the character forms differ somewhat from Japanese, the ability to infer meaning from the characters gives Japanese learners a significant advantage when studying Chinese. One of the most fascinating aspects of Chinese pronunciation is the use of four tones, which change the meaning of a word depending on pitch. These tones add a musical quality to the language—almost as if you are singing. Let's enjoy the beautiful sound of Chinese and explore the rich cultural world of the Chinese-speaking regions, shaped by thousands of years of history and tradition!

Korean (한국어) [Introductory I & II / Intermediate]

Korean is typologically the closest language to Japanese. Because the word order and grammatical structure are similar, Japanese learners often find Korean approachable once they have mastered the basics—such as reading Hangul and learning essential vocabulary. We hope you will enjoy discovering the familiarity and charm of the Korean language!

Russian (Русский язык) -Italian (Italiano) -Spanish (Español) [Basic]

In Russian, the letter "H" is pronounced as "N," and "P" as "L"—a curious feature of the Cyrillic alphabet. Yet the sounds conveyed by these seemingly strange letters evoke the vast landscapes of Russia. Italian, with its cheerful and melodic tones, speaks to the soul of song. Even among other Latin-based languages, Spanish, with its subtle shadows and emotional depth, seems perfectly suited to the rhythms of flamenco and tango.
